

# Word Work Lesson Plan and Activities

## Instructional Focus Based on the Words in the Book

## Word Work

**Instructional Focus:**  
Onomatopoeia

**Background:**  
Onomatopoeia words are words that imitate the sound of a noise. They are noise words that add sound effects to writing.

**Examples:**

boom	his	Ka-boom
shh	split	SHHHH
woosh	hur	WOOOSH
clank	bo	CLANK
clang	ch	CLANG

**Materials and Preparation:**

- A Copy of Locomotive
- Anchor Chart
- Onomatopoeia C
- Onomatopoeia M
- Optional - Onomatopoeia Step 2
- Optional - Word D

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**Word Work**

**Step 1: Introduce the Focus of Word Work**

**Sample Anchor Chart**

<b>Onomatopoeia</b>	
Boom	Ah-Cheo
Ding-dong	Gurgle
Kerplunk	Being

**Step 2: Connect Word Work to Reading**

**Before Engagement!**

- Play Onomatopoeia Charade
- Put students in groups of four to six.
- Instruct the students to act out using at least five onomatopoeias that they will perform for the class.
- Explain that the students will act out one sound at a time.
- Allow groups to practice a few times and then perform for the class.

**Onomatopoeia in the Text**

- Tell the students that the book they are reading today has many onomatopoeia words.
- Show the students page 4 and point out that many of them are onomatopoeia in the main text, too.
- Add the words Clank, Clank, Clank to the chart.
- Ask students to raise their hand if they hear an onomatopoeia as you read the rest of the book. Explain that after you read each page you will call on those hands to add more words to the list.

**Some examples of Onomatopoeia in the Text:**

- Clank-Clank-Clank
- Hissss
- Chug-chug
- Grunt
- spill
- Splash
- Clang-Clang
- Huff
- Rocketly
- Whoosh-oooo
- Bang!
- Ka-booom

## Optional Activity to Extend Engagement

List of words in the book that match the instructional focus

Word Work		Locomotive By: Brian Floca Grade Level: 3 / Guided Reading Level: O
<b>Step 3:</b> <b>Guided Word Work Practice</b>	<b>Interactive Exploration</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Explain that many comic strips use onomatopoeia to add sound effects to the pictures.</li> <li>Instruct students to come up with a short story where they will create a comic strip with six frames. Explain that they will need to incorporate at least three onomatopoeias.</li> <li>Pass out comic strip worksheets and read the instructions.</li> </ul>	
<b>Step 4:</b> <b>Independent Word Work Practice</b>	<b>Practice Page</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Pass out the <b>Onomatopoeia Matching Practice Page</b>.</li> <li>Read the instructions.</li> <li>Ask students to complete the page.</li> <li>Monitor students as they work.</li> </ul>	
<b>Step 5:</b> <b>Reconnect and Reflect on Word Work</b>	<b>Group Discussion</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Bring the students back together.</li> <li>Ask students to explain what they learned about words based on the work they completed.</li> <li>Invite students to turn and talk with a partner about their word work.</li> <li>Invite 2-3 students to share what they learned with the group.</li> </ul>	
<b>Step 6:</b> <b>Extend Word Work (optional)</b>	<b>Extension Activity</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Assign students to be on the lookout for <b>onomatopoeia</b> in their own reading. Tell them to write their words on a sticky note and add them to this anchor chart (review the added sticky notes with the class later in the day or before moving on to the next word work lesson).</li> <li>After every student can keep track of the words using the <b>Word Detective worksheet</b>.</li> </ul>
