When a writer uses literal language, he or she simply states the facts. Figurative language, in comparison, uses exaggeration to convey meaning and highlight a specific point. Description of the Here are the most common forms of figurative language: Instructional Focus Simile - a figure of speech comparing two different things by using the words like or as Example: As big as an elephant Metaphor – a figure of speech comparing two things that are unlike in most ways but alike in one important way (does not use like or as) · Example: The classroom was a zoo. Personification - a figure of speech in which human traits are given to nonliving objects Example: Lightning danced across the sky. Hyperbole – a figure of speech that makes an exaggerated statement for dramatic effect · Example: I am so hungry I could eat a horse! Onomatopoeia – a figure of speech in which a word sounds like the object it names or the sound the object makes • Example: Buzz, Sizzle, Zing, Splat, Flop, Cuckoo, Woof 6. Idiom - a phrase that means something different than the meaning of the individual words · Example: Give it a shot (try) 7.
