Ask Questions

Find word that you had difficulty reading. Tell how you used context clues to infer the meaning of the word.

Ask Questions

Who is the main character in your book? Is the character good or bad?

How do you know?

Ask Questions

What clues did the author give you to help you infer how a setting in your book might feel, smell, sound, or look?

Ask Questions

Look at the front cover of your book. Read the blurb. What can you infer the book will be about?

Why do you think so?

Ask Questions

Name a place in your book where your inference changed. What clue did the author give you to help you make a better inference?

Ask Questions

Name an emotion that a character in your book felt. What do you think happened to make the character feel that way?

Ask Questions

How did the author use action to help you infer more about the events in the story?

Ask Questions

What types of words help you to make inferences?

Ask Questions

How did your connections with the book help you to make inferences? Name a connection that helped you make an inference?

Ask Questions

Is it easier or harder to make inferences with nonfiction books? Why do you think so?

Ask Questions

Find a place in the book where a character felt happy. How did you know the character was happy?

Ask Questions

What was the problem in your book? How did the author help you make inferences about the way the problem was solved?

Ask Questions

What is the difference between making an inference and making a prediction? Which strategy did you use more often today?

Ask Questions

Use 10 words or less to explain why making inferences is a smart strategy to use as a reader.

Ask Questions

What other reading comprehension strategies do you use when you visualize? Why do these strategies work well together?

Ask Questions

How did the illustrations in your book help you to make inferences about the characters, setting, and plot?
