Make Inferences

Find a scene in your book where you inferred information about the setting. What did you infer? How did your inference help you?

Make Inferences

Find a word that you had trouble reading. Tell how you used context clues to infer the meaning of the word.

Make Inferences

Who is the main character in your book? Is the character good or bad? How do you know?

Make Inferences

What clues did the author give you to help you infer how a setting in your book might feel, smell, sound, or look?

Make Inferences

Look at the front cover of your book. Read the blurb. What can you infer the book will be about? Why do you think so?

Make Inferences

Name a place in your book where your inference changed. What clue did the author give you to help you make a better inference?

Name an emotion that a character in your book felt. What do you think happened to make the character feel that way?

How did the author use action to help you infer more about the events in the story?

What types of words help you to make inferences?

How did your connections with the book help you to make inferences? Name a connection that helped you make an inference?

Is it easier or harder to make inferences with nonfiction books? Why do you think so?

Make Inferences

Find a place in the book where a character felt happy. How did you know the character was happy?

Make Inferences

What was the problem in your book? How did the author help you make inferences about the way the problem was solved?

What is the difference between making an inference and making a prediction? Which strategy did you use more often today?

Use 10 words or less to explain why making inferences is a smart strategy to use as a reader.
