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Step 7: Write Topic Sentences

Write a topic sentence about your second question.

Step 8: Draft Your Research Report

Now it's time to use your own words to write your research report. The good news is that you've already used your own words to write topic sentences, so the rest will be a piece of cake!

Here is how to build your first paragraph:

Topic Sentence. A sentence describing the first idea/fact. A sentence describing the second idea/fact. A sentence describing the third idea/fact. A closing sentence that repeats the main idea in different words.

Topic Sentence: Tells the main idea

Supporting Sentence: Gives a reason, example, or event to explain the first idea/fact

Supporting Sentence: Gives a reason, example, or event to explain the second idea/fact

Step 8: Draft Your Research Report

Now it's time to use your own words to write your research report. The good new is that you've already used your own words to write topic sentences, so the rest will be a piece of cake!

Here is how to build your third paragraph:

Topic Sentence. A sentence describing the first idea/fact. A sentence describing the second idea/fact. A sentence describing the third idea/fact. A closing sentence that repeats the main idea in different words.

Step 9: Hook Your Reader and Let 'Em Know You're Done!

The last step to having an AMAZING research report is to write an introductory paragraph and a closing paragraph.

An introductory paragraph tells your reader what your report is about. It's a lot of fun to tease your reader, so ask them if they have ever wondered about your topic or if they know a surprising fact about your topic.

True Statement about your topic.

Surprising fact about your topic.

Sentence explaining what the reader will learn if they read your paper.

A closing paragraph tells your reader that you are done sharing information about your topic. This is a good time to write about your opinion or suggest where the reader could go to learn more.

An opinion statement about your topic.

Sentence supporting your opinion.

Sentence encouraging your reader to learn more.
